What is Dual Enrollment?

Dual enrollment refers to courses taught to high school students for which the students receive both high school credit and college credit, regardless of location or mode of delivery.

What The Research Says

Research indicates that dual enrollment increases rates of high school and college degree completion. (NACEP, Fast Facts)

Low income students that attend a dual enrollment program are 10-30% more likely to go to college. (NACEP, Fast Facts)

Dual enrollment programs increase student access to and knowledge of college programs. (WWC, Intervention Report, 2017)

Benefits

- 1. Gives students the freedom to learn in a college setting.
- 2. Allows students to experience the responsibilities and expectations of college life.
- 3. Instills the confidence needed to be successful in the future.
- 4. Saves the student time and money!





Challenges

- 1. Increased academic rigor.
- 2. Heightened responsibility and expectations.
- 3. Increased need for time management and self-advocacy.
- 4. Poor college performance affects high school and college transcripts, and could impact availability of financial aid in the future.



Q: Who is eligible for dual enrollment?

A: Juniors and seniors with a weighted GPA of 3.0 or higher (depending on their high school). Freshmen & Sophomores may be granted permission from their home school and SCC on a case-by-case basis and will establish eligibility based on additional measures.

Q: How much does it cost?

A: Current tuition and career/technology centers fees can be found at SCCDual.com.

Q: Is financial aid available?

A: Students are not eligible for financial aid and waive the ability to complete the FAFSA.

Q: Who pays for textbooks?

A: Unless otherwise stated by the high school of origin, students are responsible for purchasing textbooks, access codes, and any additional school supplies.

Q: Where and when can courses be taken?

A: SCC offers dual enrollment courses in person, online, at their high school, or career/technology campus. Course offerings are subject to change depending on instructor availability and student interest. Students should consult with their high school counselor and SCC's dual enrollment department for more information on course availability. Students are able to take courses during the spring, summer, and fall semesters as long as they are enrolled at their high school.

Q: Do I have to take a standardized test?

A: Multiple measures are used to determine dual enrollment eligibility.

Students may qualify based on high school GPA as long as all individual course prerequisites are met. Students may also be eligible based on ACT, SAT, or Accuplacer test scores. The Accuplacer test can be taken by scheduling an appointment with the Dual Enrollment Office at the Spartanburg (Giles) Campus or with an Admissions Counselor at the Tyger River Campus and Downtown Campus.

Grade Level Checkpoints

8th Grade

- Research dual enrollment including benefits and challenges.
- Talk with your parents about whether dual enrollment is a good choice for you.
- Do your best work in all your classes to put yourself in a good position for dual enrollment early in your high school career.
- Research the ACCUPLACER placement test.

9th Grade

- Research Spartanburg Community College and possible courses to take.
- Visit the SCC campus.
- Think about subjects, courses, and careers you may be interested in.
- Talk with other high school students about their dual enrollment experience.
- Take the ACCUPLACER placement test (required for enrollment as a sophomore).

Grade Level Checkpoints

10th Grade

- Discuss dual enrollment with your high school counselor.
- Apply for the dual enrollment program by completing the online application.
- Schedule an appointment with an SCC dual enrollment counselor and complete to complete the ACCUPLACER placement test (if not already taken).
- Register for classes.
- Attend a dual enrollment orientation.

11th grade

- Meet with your SCC dual enrollment counselor for advisement and class registration.
- Regularly contact your high school counselor to update them on course progress.
- Attend group sessions and meetings held by your SCC dual enrollment success coach.
- Use SCC campus resources like the Library and The Learning Center to get the most out of your courses.

Grade Level Checkpoints (cont.)

12th Grade

- Meet with your SCC dual enrollment counselor for advisement and class registration.
- Regularly contact your high school counselor to update them on course progress.
- Attend group sessions and meetings held by your SCC dual enrollment success coach.
- Attend events on the SCC campus that help foster your sense of community.
- Meet with your SCC College Transition Coordinator for assistance with next steps to enroll at SCC or another college after graduation.
- Use SCC campus resources like Career Services to help you move into the workforce after graduation.

FERPA

Students are accountable for their classes and are the contact point for discussing grades, attendance, and academic progress with instructors.

Parents should refrain from contacting instructors about their student as this interferes with FERPA.

Introduce an open dialogue with your students about their academic progress.


